Getting around

London is a walkable and cyclable city, and has an extensive public transport system to help you get around in a quick and environmentally friendly way. Our concierge team will be delighted to help you find the most suitable means of transport.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Many of London's public buses are electric or zero emission, and the London Underground network is a sustainable and quick way to get around the city. Your nearest tube stations are Piccadilly Circus (Bakerloo line and Piccadilly line), Leicester Square (Northern line and Piccadilly line), and Tottenham Court (Central line, Northern line, and Elizabeth line), all of which are a 5-minute walk away from the hotel.

You will also find public bus stops one minute away from the hotel on the main road, which you can ride by tapping in with your contactless card. Several hop on hop off bus tours stop near the hotel as well: Golden Tours is a 5-minute walk away to Haymarket bus stop, and Big Bus tours can be found a 6-minute walk away at the Piccadilly Circus Bus stop.



BICYCLES

There are Santander electric bicycles for hire on Wardour Street and Frith Street, both a 2-minute walk away, and Lime bikes can be hired on Wardour street, a 4-minute walk away. You will also find other bicycle hire companies around London, such as Forest and Tier.

TAXI

There are many electric Taxi's operating in London, such as Uno Cars, Green Tomato Cars, and Traditional London Black Cab Electric. When you ask us to arrange a taxi for you, we will always try to get you an electric taxi.

Attractions

BUCKINGHAM PALACE

Home to Queen Elizabeth II, Changing of the Guard takes place every other day during winter and every day during summer. The Palace is open to the public from July till end of September Open daily 09:30AM - 19:00PM, last admission 16:45.



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WESTMINSTER ABBEY

The only Abbey in Central London and the burial place of many past Kings and Queens. A Great site to visit, though one of the busiest and toughest to simply walk through the front door. Make sure you visit early in the mornings to avoid disappointment.

TOWER OF LONDON AND THE CROWN JEWELS

Home of the Crown Jewels, this historic building hosted some executions of past Kings and Queens of England. Lots of History and a great part of town with some hidden locations. Make sure you head to St Katherine Docks for lunch.

HYDE PARK

One of London's largest parks, where you can find the Peter Pan statue and the Serpentine Lake (where boating is available during the summer). Hyde Park also offers horse riding and a café.

TATE GALLERY

Houses the National Collection of British paintings from the sixteenth century to Present day, also international modern art, painting, sculpture, drawings, water colours and modern prints. The Clore Gallery, added in 1987, houses the Turner Bequest, works by J M W Turner.

TATE MODERN

One of the latest addition to London's Galleries, The Tate Modern houses the best of Britain's Contemporary Art. Situated on the South Bank at the site of the Bankside Power Station.

THE LONDON EYE

For a classic bird's eye view of London, take a 'flight' on the British Airways London Eye, situated on the South Bank. Injected with some technology on board to offer more information on what you are seeing. This 30 minute flight has some breath-taking views.

MADAM TUSSAUD'S

Wax work museum for a peep at the new, old, and the horrible. This is London's most popular tourist attraction. Set in the heart of Marylebone, one to recommend, especially for children. Take close up photos of wax model celebrities.



BRITISH MUSEUM

One of the world's greatest museums, it has an unrivalled collection of antiques from all over the globe. Showing man's development from pre-historic time till today. Be prepared to spend a minimum of 4 hours here.

WINDSOR CASTLE

The oldest and largest occupied Castle in the World; this is the Official Residence of her Majesty the Queen. Exhibitions include the State Apartments, Queen Mary's Doll House, Royal Carriages, porcelain, armour and priceless paintings. This is further out from Central London, but if you have the time, this is a location well worth the visit. Saville Gardens in Windsor Great Park comprising 35 acres of beautiful woodland gardens with many rare trees, flowers and shrubs.

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THORPE PARK

Britain's first theme park with fantastic rides, trains, steamers, a farm, funfair, waterlog ride, shops, restaurants, water skiing and an American fort is the ideal fun packed venue.

VICTORIA AND ALBERT MUSEUM

Built to house the collection of treasures from the reign of Queen Victoria, now host too many collections of art and exhibitions. Check online or with Concierge to find out what they are exhibiting at the time.

NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

The largest skeleton of a dinosaur can be found here, together with many archaeological finds. A beautiful building where you could spend days stuck inside.

TRAFALGAR SQUARE

The fountains of Trafalgar Square stand proudly, watched over by Nelson's Column. Owned by the Queen in right of the crown but managed by Greater London Authority.

PARLIAMENT SQUARE, THE HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT, BIG BEN

The ancestral home of Parliament watched over by London's most attractive timepiece, Big Ben. Please speak to the reception team should you wish to visit a Parliamentary debate.



ST PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

Built by Sir Christopher Wren, the climb to the top is well worth it, as London can fully be seen. This is a great site with plenty of history to set you back so many years.

SOHO SQUARE



MOUNT STREET GARDENS

This is an excellent, classic place to "get away" if you're around Mayfair, which is already quite quaint for its proximity to bustling Central London. It is a lovely place to have a break in the middle of the day and read a book or just let the time pass by.
